EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

APLA has long recognised the value of the Adelaide Park Lands to the city, state and its inhabitants.

The Adelaide Park Lands receive in excess of 10 million visitations annually, and as custodians of the Park Lands, the City of Adelaide is responsible for the maintenance and enhancement of these invaluable assets.

In acknowledging community interest to support the Park Lands through philanthropic means, it is proposed an Adelaide Park Lands Foundation be established (by Council). This foundation would allow for tax-deductable donations to be received for specified Park Lands projects.

Such a foundation would not seek to abrogate the City of Adelaide's efforts or responsibility for maintaining the Park Lands, however it would seek to galvanise long-term support for better conserving and supporting the Adelaide Park Lands.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT THE ADELAIDE PARK LANDS AUTHORITY ADVISES COUNCIL:

That the Adelaide Park Lands Authority:

- 1. Supports the creation of an independent Foundation for the purposes of public fundraising for investment in long-term enhancement and protection of the Adelaide Park Lands.
- 2. Supports the creation of a Foundation that is legally and operationally autonomous from Council and its subsidiaries in an effort to attain and maintain Deductible Gift Receipt (DGR) status.


DISCUSSION

- 1. The Adelaide Park Lands receive in excess of 10 million visitations annually, with the City of Adelaide responsible for managing approximately 723ha of the Adelaide Park Lands (74% of the total 930ha) including the six Squares and River Torrens / Karrawirra Pari, as shown in the Adelaide Park Lands Plan.
- 2. In a report received in November 2019 by Council, it was estimated the City of Adelaide expends approximately \$25 million per annum on Park Lands capital works and maintenance.
- 3. Since the establishment of the *Adelaide Park Lands Act 2005 (SA)*, members of the community have shown an interest in making donations of time and money in the advancement of enhancement and conservation of the Adelaide Park Lands.
- 4. Whilst the Adelaide Park Lands Act 2005 (SA) does provide for the creation of the Adelaide Park Lands Fund, a report presented to the Authority in March 2009 concluded that the Adelaide Park Lands Fund is not eligible for deductible gift recipient (DGR) status.
- 5. In December 2012, APLA investigated the creation of a philanthropic fund for the purposes of fundraising. The report concluded that it was not feasible for APLA to engage in the creation of an independent fund.
- 6. Similarly, in March 2019, through advice as a result of a Motion on Notice at a meeting of APLA, the Administration confirmed that any DGR endorsed foundation would require legal and operational autonomy from Council & its subsidiaries (if it was to obtain a tax-deductible status).
- 7. It is clear from the multiple attempts that APLA nor Council have the required independence to set up a DGR endorsed fund.
- 8. A structured analysis into a legal & financial framework with DGR endorsement has not been investigated by the Council.
- 9. Similarly, no thorough financial feasibility has been provided to accompany any options of an independent Foundation by the Council.
- 10. Although the proposed Foundation will need to be legally and operationally autonomous, it will also need to ensure it is compliant with the recommendations of APLA and Council.
- 11. For this reason it is proposed that that the expenditure of fundraised money would be allocated only to Council endorsed projects, which are in keeping with the Adelaide Park Lands Management Strategy and have been supported by the Adelaide Park Lands Authority.
- 12. It is proposed that the Adelaide Park Lands Foundation would raise funds on behalf of Park Lands projects and initiatives which protect and enhance the Park Lands.
- 13. Philanthropic fundraising for Park Lands via the proposed Foundation would be for conservation and projects (not for the general maintenance and upkeep of the Park Lands).
- 14. A DGR endorsed fund would allow the community to be engaged in the Park Lands whilst also being able to lodge their donations through a tax-deductible mechanism.

- In June 2019 the State Government committed \$3M to City of Adelaide for the design and construction of the new City Skate Park at Glady Elphick Park/Narnungga (Park 25), West Terrace
- City of Adelaide engaged Convic to undertake the design and consultation for the new skate facility
- The concept design has been finalised incorporating feedback received through the consultation. Key stakeholder engagement is on-going to refine specific elements.
- Detailed design is currently underway and it is anticipated that works will commence on site by the end of 2020 and be completed mid 2021.

City Skate Park Timeline

City Skate Park was established on North Terrace in 2000 with funding support from the State Government A new City Skate Park was an election commitment of the Labour Government in 2014 and followed lobbying from the skate and BMX communities City of Adelaide commenced consultation in 2015 to help determine a suitable location and formed the City Skate Advisory Group (CSAG) In September 2019, City of Adelaide engaged Convic to undertake further consultation and prepare designs for construction.

Detailed design is underway and construction expected to commence late 2020

The lease for the site ended in June 2014 when the site was identified as a development location for the UniSA health building In 2015 a temporary skate facility was constructed by City of Adelaide in King Rodney Park/Ityamai-Itpina (Park 15) with funding support from State Government.

In June 2019 the State Government committed \$3M to City of Adelaide for the design and construction of the new City Skate Park at Glady Elphick Park/Narnungga (Park 25), West Terrace

In August 2020 Convic finalised the concept design incorporating feedback received through the consultation. Key stakeholder engagement is on-going to refine specific elements

City Skate Park - Update Site Constraints

During the design investigations significant site restrictions have limited the potential development of the skate park;


- 1.5m of uncontrolled fill present on the site
- · Significant and regulated trees
- Expected contamination
- · SAPN and SA Water services
- · Gradient and sloping site

To mitigate these restrictions a number of parameters for the design were established:

- 1.5m of material to be striped from the site, conditioned and replaced in compacted layers
- Significant and regulated trees to be retained on site
- · Contamination to be addressed on-site
- Services to be maintained and avoided where possible.







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City Skate Park Consultation

Consultation for the new City Skate Park has been on-going since 2015 and has involved;

- Extensive community consultation in 2015 to establish a preferred location which included;
 - · Feedback through the YourSay Adelaide site and online
 - On-site engagement
 - Attendance at Skate Board Australia Events
- Following the State Government funding announcement In 2019 City of Adelaide undertook further consultation to inform the design of the new City Skate Park which involved;
 - Establishment of the City Skate Advisory Group
 - On-site engagement at Park 25
 - · Key stakeholder meetings
 - 3 x Workshops





City Skate Park Vision and Design Criteria

Vision:

The Adelaide city skate park will be inviting, family friendly and celebrate the unique context of Adelaide. It will cater for all disciplines and skill levels and be a stand out destination within south Australia's skate park network.

Design Criteria

- 1. rationalise design to work with tight site constraints
- 2. consideration of capacity, user progression and riding styles
- 3. address physical and visual disconnect from west terrace
- 4. drawing people into the space: sculpture, vibrancy, intrigue, elevated lookouts, spectator stations...
- 5. landscape integration of 'left over space' within areas
- 6. permeable surface consideration to treat 'left over TPZ space'
- 7. skate / landscape / root zones all feel part of one facility
- 8. address change in elevation + movement up and down site for skate and pedestrians
- 9. address CPTED principles to promote a family friendly inviting space
- 10. extension of urban fabric into gladys elphick park / narnungga
- 11. incorporate key consultation feedback into design


