

Strengths and Issues

The Master Plan aims to build upon valued aspects of the square while also addressing its shortcomings.

Analysis and community feedback identified how well the space has served the community. By identifying the square's strengths and weaknesses, this then provided clear areas for reinforcement and improvement in the areas of nature, function, community and activity.

Strengths



Nature: Mature trees and plants provide shade and contribute to the character/identity of the square



Function: Green, relaxed and local atmosphere



Activity: Community activity with verge gardens and basketball court



Community: Great mix of residents, businesses and buildings with rich history

Issues



Nature: Some sub-optimal trees and barren outer footpath areas



Function: Limited variety of spaces, shade and seating



Activity: Lack of facilities for events and limited activities



Safety: Concerns for safety crossing roads and chance of antisocial behaviour

Enduring green and attractive legacy


- The beauty and comfort of living green trees and plants is the 'headline act' now and in the future

- Enriched by the neighbourhood's history and community celebrations


Local community vitality day and evening

- The place of choice for holding local community events











ACTION 5

Foster inclusiveness through art, interpretation and play

to celebrate what is unique about the square through surprising, engaging and delightful art and playful elements.



Action 5 addresses:

- Activity: Little to engage young children but this was much desired by many
- Nature: Desire for high quality and beautiful features to elevate the experience
- Activity: Community interest including new elements that encourage exercise
- Community: Great opportunity to furthur celebrate the rich history and local community

Key initiatives of Action 5 include to:

- 5.1 Develop a holistic art strategy that places the experience of art, interpretation and play as fundamental to the square
- Place art at the centre of design development of the master plan
- Develop integrated art concepts that celebrate and reflect the specifics of this place, histories and communities by working within the three identified themes (refer to appendix)
- 5.2 Deliver art that encourages interaction and play for all ages





5.3 Add surprise and delight through art

- Include artistic elements at the smaller human scale to add interest to different spaces within the square
- Investigate inclusion of an interactive water feature in a suitable location that contributes to a high quality urban park experience
- Ensure all works consider their approach to night lighting


DRAFT Public Art Themes

Bring to life the rich history of the many cultures who have contributed to the south-west community. Bring to life the Kaurna relationship to this part of the plains, both pre and post european settlement, and celebrate the Square's Kaurna naming after Iparrityi an important elder.

Express the melting pot of cultures post european settlement, including Kaurna families that where part of the rich multicultural community along with Colonial settlers, the Afgan cameleers, various waves of migrant families and other Aboriginal language groups from across South Australia and Northern Territory visiting the city.
