Acknowledgment of Country & Moment Silence in Remembrance of Departed Community Members

Co-Chair, Lord Mayor Sandy Verschoor read the Kurna Acknowledgement.

'The City of Adelaide Reconciliation Committee acknowledges that we are meeting on traditional Country of the Kurna people of the Adelaide Plains and pays respect to Elders past and present. We recognise and respect their cultural heritage, beliefs and relationship with the land. We acknowledge that they are of continuing importance to the Kurna people living today.

And we also extend that respect to other Aboriginal Language Groups and other First Nations who are present today.'

- Item 6.1 – Pelzer park / Pityarilla (Park 19) Public Art Concept Proposal: Kardi Munta sculpture
 - The Committee noted that the update on the public art proposal for Pityarilla by Paul Herzich, Artis had been rescheduled to the 4 December 2019 meeting of the Reconciliation Committee.
- Item 6.2 – Indigenous Business Australia (IBA) presentation
 - Mr Wayne Ranger, Manager, Home Lending, IBA provided an update on the current programs available to wider Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.
 - Ms Nicole Gollan, Reconciliation Officer, Participation & Inclusion, City of Adelaide, undertook to provide the contact details of Mr Wayne Ranger to Committee members to enable further discussion.
- Item 6.4 – Housing SA: Tika Tirka Project Update
 - Mr David Holmes Regional Manager Eastern Adelaide, HousingSA, Mr Eddie Ansell and Ms Kimberley Wanganeen, Tika Tirka Project Officer provided an update on new Tika Tirka Aboriginal Student Accommodation opening in the CBD in October 2019.

 - Mr Marty Reeve, Consultant Reconciliation Projects, Participation & Inclusion provided an update of the recently completed cultural biodiversity woodwork interpretation in the Parklands.
- Item 6.5 – Kurna Yerta Aboriginal Corporation (KYAC) update
 - Mr Jeffrey Newchurch, KYAC Chairperson, provided an update:
 - on a visit to Canberra and the Ceremony for repatriation of Kurna Old People remains into Kingston Park and presented the Lord Mayor Sandy Verschoor with a T-Shirt celebrating/encouraging repatriation of ancestral remains.
 - on KYAC activity, processes and priorities.
- Item 6.6 – Adelaide Zero Project: Aboriginal Mobility Project Update
 - Ms Caro Mader, Manager Participation and Inclusion provided an update:
 - in relation to remote visitors and the activity, processes and priorities in response.
 - on the Adelaide Zero Project investigations into Aboriginal mobility to understand and respond to a range of drivers underpinning visiting and public drinking by members of regional/ remote Aboriginal communities in Adelaide in order to tailor compassionate responses to these drivers.
 - and undertook to pass on comments raised and the interest of Mr Jeffrey Newchurch & Ms Yvonne Agius to be part of the Adelaide Zero Project: Aboriginal Mobility Project conversation.
 - Lord Mayor Sandy Verschoor left the meeting at 4.14 pm and re-entered at 4.27 pm and Councillor Franz Knoll left the meeting at 4.15 pm and re-entered at 4.16 pm.

Many of these families came from public housing and the majority would not have qualified for finance anywhere else.

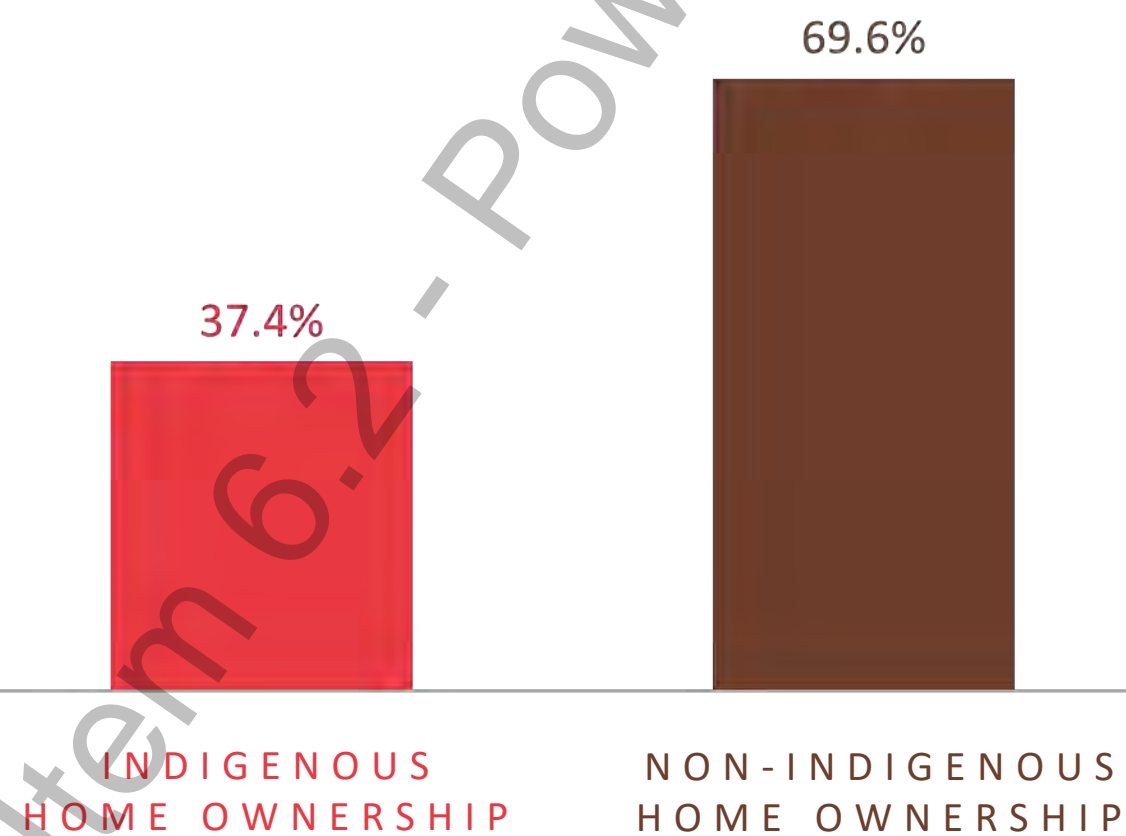
We do this by providing:

From entrepreneurs who are just starting their journey, to well established businesses wanting to expand, IBA can help make your dreams a reality.

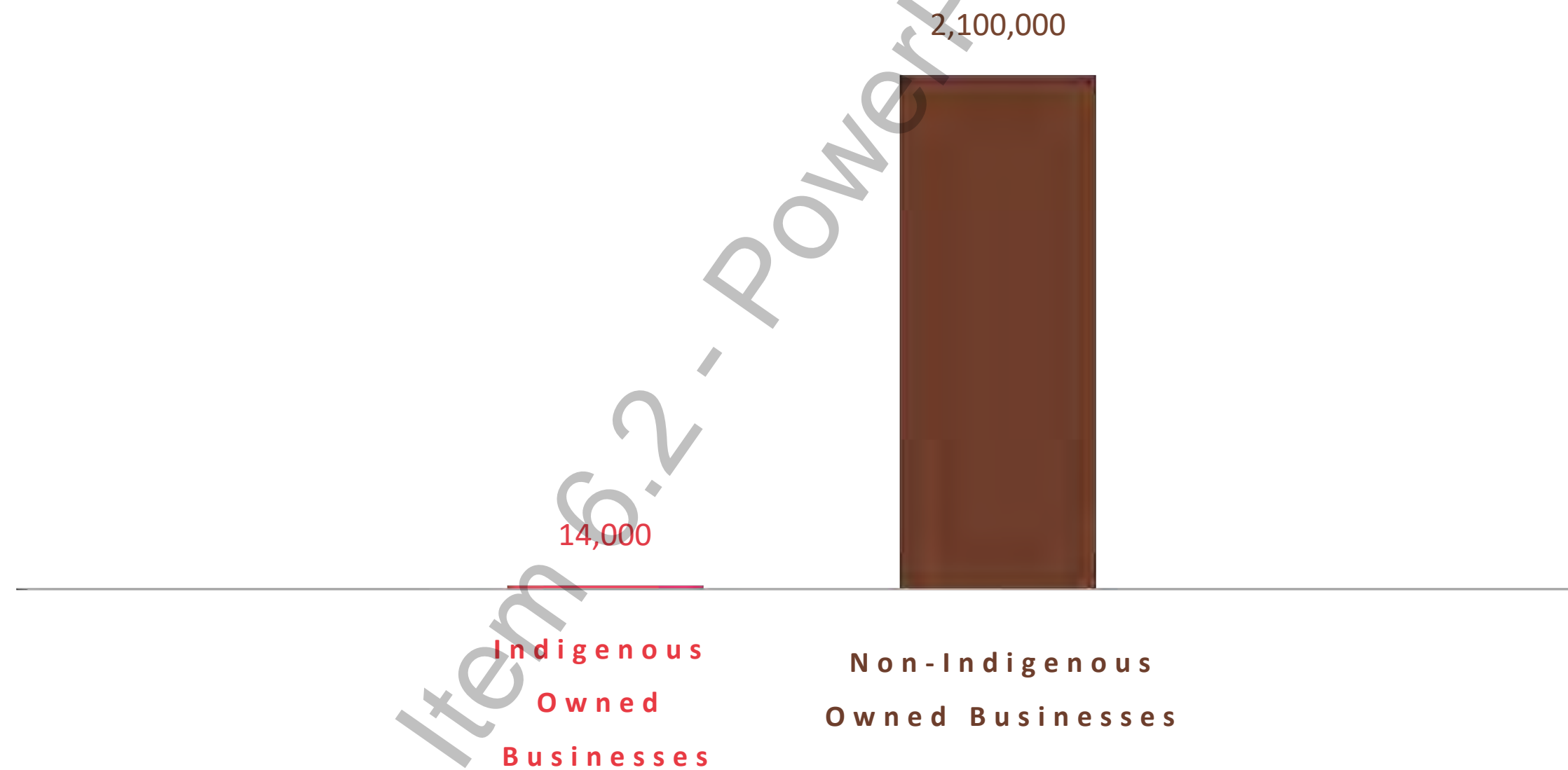
We do this in a number of ways, including:
