## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On 22 May 2018, the City of Adelaide endorsed its second consecutive Stretch Reconciliation Action Plan 2018-2021, launched on 28 May 2018 at Reconciliation SA's National Reconciliation Week Breakfast.

On 1 July 2018, the Stretch Reconciliation Action Plan 2018-2021 took effect, guiding a shared vision for delivery of meaningful reconciliation between the City of Adelaide and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) delivery is monitored internally by a Reconciliation Action Plan Team (RAPT) that meets quarterly. Updates provided at this meeting form the basis of this update report to the Reconciliation Committee, Council and Reconciliation Australia. Reconciliation Australia, the creator of the RAP tool and with whom the City of Adelaide Stretch RAP 2018-2021 is registered, also monitor City of Adelaide Stretch RAP 2018-2021 implementation via an annual progress report.

Implementation of City of Adelaide Stretch RAP 2018-2021 actions delivered to date is noted here.

## DISCUSSION

1. On 22 May 2018, City of Adelaide endorsed its second Stretch Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) 2018-2021 [[Link 1](#)].
2. The City of Adelaide's Stretch RAP 2018-2021 builds on the legacy of previous City of Adelaide RAPs in guiding Council's vision for meaningful reconciliation with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the City and more widely.
3. The City of Adelaide's Stretch RAP 2018-2021 has 50 actions. Each has an officer of Council who, alongside their team and leaders, co-created the action including its timing, resourcing and integrated strategic alignment and who is responsible for its delivery.
4. Quarterly monitoring of delivery progress of the 50 Stretch RAP 2018-2021 actions is undertaken by the team of 37 RAP action holders or RAP Champions. Their updates form the basis of this report.
5. A range of actions have been delivered and are captured in the Stretch RAP 2018-2021 Implementation Progress Report [[Link 2](#)].
6. The City of Adelaide RAP champions commend this update to the Reconciliation Committee.
