1 Acknowledgement of Country

At the opening of the Council meeting, the Lord Mayor stated:

We recognise and respect their cultural heritage, beliefs and relationship with the land. We acknowledge that they are of continuing importance to the Kaurna people living today.

And we also extend that respect to other Aboriginal Language Groups and other First Nations who are present today.'

8 Declaration of Conflict of Interest

Councillor Freeman declared a material conflict of interest in Item 17.2 [Councillor Davis - MoN - Current Cost of Living Pressures], pursuant to Section 74 of the *Local Government Act 1999* (SA) as it directly referenced her employer Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) and his operations, and that she would vacate her Chair and leave the room during consideration of the matter.

Councillor Snape entered the Council Chamber at 6.36 pm.

Councillor Freeman declared a general conflict of interest in Item 17.5 [Councillor Martin - MoN - City of Adelaide Priorities for State Government Funding], pursuant to Section 74 of the *Local Government Act 1999* (SA) as it relates to operations of her employer Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT), but that she would stay in the room, participate in the debate and vote on the matter.

Councillor Martin declared a general conflict of interest in Item 13 [Recommendation 2 - Extreme Weather Support for People Sleeping Rough], pursuant to Section 74 of the *Local Government Act 1999* (SA) as he has a relative who works in the homelessness sector at Baptist Care but that he would stay in the room, participate in the discussion and vote on the matter.

The Lord Mayor declared a general conflict of interest in Item 17.4 [Councillor Martin - MoN - AEDA 26/27 Budget Allocation], pursuant to Section 74 of the *Local Government Act 1999* (SA) as she is a Board Member of AEDA but that as it was not directly allocating funds to AEDA, that she would stay in the room, participate in the discussion and vote on the matter.

17.1 Councillor Couros - MoN - North Adelaide Dog Park - Accessibility Infrastructure and Maintenance Improvements

Moved by Councillor Couros,
Seconded by Deputy Lord Mayor, Councillor Noon –

That Council:

1. Notes community concerns regarding the current condition and accessibility of the North Adelaide Dog Park, including:
 - a. Poor access for people with disabilities, particularly following rainfall events where surfaces become unsafe or impassable.
 - b. Deterioration of access during winter months due to mud, potholes, and drainage issues;
 - c. Lack of public toilet
 - d. Insufficient seating for park users.
 - e. The prevalence of three-cornered jacks (bindii) creates discomfort and safety concerns for both dogs and park users.
2. Acknowledges that the current access pathway from Medindie Road and Lefevre Terrace entrance becomes:
 - a. A dust-prone surface during summer; and
 - b. A muddy, uneven and hazardous track during winter, limiting usability and accessibility.
3. Requests Administration to undertake an investigation and report back to Council on:
 - a. Options to improve accessibility, including compliance with disability access standards.
 - b. The feasibility and cost of constructing a paved or concreted pathway from Medindie Road to the small dog park entrance.
 - c. Improvements to drainage and surface conditions to ensure year-round usability.
 - d. The provision of additional seating within the dog park.
 - e. The feasibility and cost of installing public toilet facilities
 - f. Measures to control and eradicate three-cornered jacks (bindii), including ongoing maintenance programs.
 - g. Any staged or priority works that could be delivered in the short term.
4. Requests Administration to identify potential funding sources, including consideration through the Annual Business Plan and Budget process.

- c. The lack of disability parking at the site and poor access to the toilets.
 - d. The lack of sealed paths to and within the dog park making it difficult for wheelchairs and walkers to move to and within the dog park.
 - d. Insufficient seating for park users.
 - e. Poor signage resulting in big dogs entering the small dog park creating an unsafe environment.
2. Acknowledges that the current access pathway from Medindie Road and Lefevre Terrace entrance becomes:
- a. A dust-prone surface during summer; and
 - b. A muddy, uneven, and hazardous track during winter, limiting usability and accessibility.
3. Requests Administration to undertake an investigation and report back to Council on;
- a. Allocating 2 disability car parks on Medindie Rd close to the small dog park entrance.
 - b. constructing a sealed path from the roadway to the gate of the small dog park
 - c. constructing a sealed path inside the perimeter of the small dog park suitable to wheelchairs and walkers.
 - d. The provision of additional seating within the small dog park.
 - e. More prominent signage explaining the size of dogs permitted in the small dog park.
4. Request Administration to identify potential funding sources, including within the 4th Quarter of the 2025/26 budget and/or as part of the 2026/27 Annual Budget Plan and Budget.
5. The small dog park be considered as a priority with accessibility issues in the large dog park to be considered as soon as practicable.'

Discussion ensued, during which with the consent of the mover, seconder and the meeting Part 4 of the amended was varied to remove the words 'the 4th Quarter of'.

The disclosure of information in this Item contains material provided on a confidential basis which the State Government has requested be considered in confidence on the grounds that the details of the request are sensitive in nature and the release of this information prematurely may be misleading. The disclosure of information in this report could reasonably be expected to prejudice the position and any negotiations by the City of Adelaide with the State Government.

Public Interest

The Chief Executive Officer is satisfied that the principle that the meeting be conducted in a place open to the public has been outweighed in the circumstances because the disclosure of information would divulge information provided on a confidential basis and may prejudice Council's ability to discuss/participate or influence a proposal for the benefit of the Council and the community in this matter which on balance would be contrary to the public interest.

 - ii. Seeks to be consulted about any application for the granting of a liquor licence for outdoor events for the premises in lower North Adelaide known as St Ann's

Requests any future liquor licence application assessments in that location take into consideration that neighbouring residents have formally complained about excessive noise from the property during approved events, and seek limits to noise emissions for any future events noting a preference instead for indoor events.
 - b. Write to St Ann's to express Council's disappointment that a communication recently circulated to North Adelaide residents incorrectly claimed the event was "approved by the City of Adelaide".

3. Notes that the Adelaide CBD continues to recover from the impacts of COVID-19 and remains sensitive to reductions in visitation;
4. Requests that the Chief Executive Officer write to the State Government advocating for the immediate introduction of free public transport across metropolitan Adelaide for the months of April and May;
5. Further requests that the correspondence highlight the benefits of such a measure in supporting CBD businesses, increasing visitation, improving accessibility, and alleviating cost of living pressures for South Australians.

Discussion ensued, during which with the consent of the mover and seconder, the Lord Mayor advised the motion would be taken in parts.

Requests the Chief Executive Officer to provide a report on scalable options for the 2026/27 Budget and Business Plan, having regard to the potential impact of escalating Middle East conflict, inflationary pressures, broader market disruption, cost-of-living pressures, business conditions and Council's long-term financial sustainability, including:
 - a. options to minimise any rate increase proposed for 2026/27;
 - b. options to prioritise core services, essential renewals and compliance works over non-essential capital upgrades or discretionary uplift projects;
 - c. measures to support city businesses, including temporary Outdoor Dining fee relief, moderated UPark pricing and other targeted support initiatives;
 - d. the feasibility and funding implications of a contingency business-support fund;
 - e. contingency options that could be activated if external conditions materially worsen; and
 - f. the use of relevant economic, visitation, trading, parking and market data, utilising data from AEDA and ACMA, to inform any recommended response.
2. Notes that this request is for prudent forward planning only, and not for immediate budget intervention, with any measures to be scalable, evidence-based, and capable of being activated, adjusted or withdrawn if conditions materially worsen and negatively affect the city, its businesses and ratepayers.

3. Requests that the report be brought back to Council as a matter of priority to inform finalisation of the 2026/27 Budget and Business Plan.

2. Assist AEDA to develop an alternative option to their proposal to spend in excess of one third of the increase above on the Rundle Mall Birthday celebrations, noting this expenditure would likely mostly benefit Rundle Mall traders and could be more appropriately funded through the Rundle Mall levy.

17.6 Councillor Freeman - MoN - Pop-up Cycling Trial

Moved by Councillor Freeman,
Seconded by Councillor Snape -

THAT COUNCIL:

1. Notes that rising fuel costs are increasing cost-of-living pressures, which may reduce visitation to the City of Adelaide.
2. Notes that cycling provides a fuel-free transport option that is viable for shorter trips, as supported by Council's adopted Integrated Climate Strategy and Integrated Transport Strategy.
3.  - 3.1. Installation of temporary bikeway infrastructure on key network routes
 - 3.2. Provision of secure bicycle parking in strategic locations, including eBike charging facilities.
 - 3.3. Improved cycling network legibility through online communications, mapping, and wayfinding.
4. Requests the Administration to present a report to Council by the end of September 2026 outlining recommendations for implementing the trial, including proposed scope, locations, costs, timeframes, impact mitigation measures, and a monitoring and evaluation framework.

QUESTION ON NOTICE

Deputy Lord Mayor, Councillor Carmel Noon will ask the following Question on Notice:

'Noting that under the Adelaide Park Lands Act 2005, the Adelaide Parklands Management Strategy and the City's Community Land Management Plan (CLMP) our Parklands are intended to be accessible to all people - a community asset intended for enduring public use and enjoyment - not exclusion, therefore can the Administration please advise:

1. Why Rymill Park has been fenced off since 22 January 2026, approximately two months prior to the commencement of the Fringe Festival, and the rationale for the timing of the fencing.
2. What approvals and authorisations were provided to permit fencing for this duration, including:
 - o The decision-making process
 - o Any conditions placed on early site occupation
3. Why pedestrian access through Rymill Park has been restricted to a single opening at the western end, and whether consideration was given to:
 - o Maintaining east–west pedestrian permeability
 - o Access for residents and pedestrians from the eastern end of the City
4. What assessment was undertaken of the impacts on public access, particularly for:
 - o Daily commuters
 - o People with mobility limitations
 - o Residents of the eastern end of Adelaide
5. Whether alternative access routes or mitigation measures were considered or implemented to minimise disruption to public movement through the Park Lands during this extended period.
6. Given the extended duration of fencing, can officers advise whether future events will be required to demonstrate how public access through the Park Lands will be maintained wherever practicable?'

REPLY

1. Fencing of Rymill Park commenced on Thursday 22 January 2026 for the event bump-in period. This start date was four weeks prior to the Adelaide Fringe/Gluttony opening on Thursday 19 February 2026.
 - 1.1. This period of bump-in is commensurate to an event of this size and scale, which is one of the largest events held in the City of Adelaide (CoA) annually with significant patronage.

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- 1.2. As an Arts Venue Hub with over 200 shows, the event requires the construction of 13 temporary entertainment venues and 32 catering outlets, amongst many other event offerings and supporting infrastructure.
- 1.3. The Park Lands occupation period for the event in 2026 was consistent with previous years.
2. Approvals for this Event were given under a five year licence agreement approved by Council in 2024 for the period of 2025 - 2029. A subsequent annual event notice details fencing and other operational requirements and is informed by the Community Land Management Plan and the Adelaide Event Guidelines. Conditions include elements such as staged bump-in and agreed work hours for any activities likely to cause disturbance.
 - 2.1. The event bump-in was a staged process allowing public access to pathways and areas of the Park, as long as it was deemed safe to do so.
 - 2.2. The full event site was fenced off entirely from Tuesday 27 January 2026, approximately three weeks prior to the Adelaide Fringe opening. At this time detour signage was installed by the Event to advise the public of alternative walking and cycling routes.
 - 2.3. Once the event opened to the public for a period of 4.5 weeks during the Adelaide Fringe, the Park and its pathways remained accessible during the event operating hours, with four accessible entry and exit points [\[Link 1\]](#) available on all sides of the park.
3. Public access and safety through the Park Lands is always taken into consideration during an event period.
 - 3.1. Pedestrian access is restricted within an event site when the area is considered a work and construction zone, with heavy machinery, large trucks, cranes and other work being undertaken. This is consistent with work health and safety requirements for any such activities.
 - 3.2. Access around the perimeter of the Park and into/out of the city was maintained along footpaths and bike lanes at all times.
 - 3.3. East West access was not impacted along footpaths, bike lanes or roads as a result of the Gluttony event in Rymill Park.
 - 3.4. Alternative routes were available while the Parks Lands' pathways were disrupted. There are sealed, accessible footpaths surrounding the Park which remain accessible at all times and allow East and West travel around the Park Land, including for people with mobility limitations
 - 3.5. These routes can be less of a direct passage but do maintain east west pedestrian permeability.
4. Maintaining public access through the Park Lands is always preferable and is at the forefront of CoA discussions with event organisers. However as recognised within the *Adelaide Parklands Management Strategy - Towards 2036*, this is not always possible during major event occupation periods as public safety needs to be considered and prioritised.
5. The *Adelaide Parklands Management Strategy - Towards 2036* also includes:
 - *The Adelaide Park Lands should be held for the public benefit of the people of South Australia, and should be generally available to them for their use and enjoyment (recognising that certain uses of the Park Lands may restrict or prevent access to particular parts of the Park Lands).*
 - *Acknowledging that certain uses may temporarily restrict or prevent access to particular parts of the Adelaide Park Lands ensures that uses such as ticketed events can occur.*

2. Connections to bikeways beyond the Council boundary that currently provide a reduced level of service within the City of Adelaide due to inconsistent, terminating, or missing infrastructure.
3. For each identified network gap, the number of reported crashes involving cyclists over the past five years?'

1. The City of Adelaide Integrated Transport Strategy (ITS) includes a Future State Network Map for Cycling (micromobility) that identifies route classifications and the recommended type of facility / infrastructure ([Link 1](#)).
2. Based on existing traffic volumes, vehicle speeds and road infrastructure, the majority of C1 (Regional) and C2 (District) cycling routes do not provide the recommended type of cycling facility to support their intended future network function as identified in the ITS.
3. The Administration is currently mapping the Future State Network Maps against the existing network level of service to document the location and nature of the gaps and to support the development of a prioritised program of interventions, including infrastructure upgrades, to address the gaps.
4. The Administration has been provided crash data for the 2020-2024 period from the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) which includes reported crashes involving cyclists. These will be considered in the assessment of existing conditions and options; however the prioritisation of interventions will be based on a proactive network safety plan approach.
5. Road crash data is publicly available on the Government of South Australia Location SA website ([Link 2](#)).
6. Changes to the City of Adelaide Transport network to provide improved cycling facilities forms part of the ITS Implementation Plan which will be presented to Committee and Council in due course.
