LIMIT OF FUNDING

Maximum of \$100,000 per application.

FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

One round per year, funding permitting

Adelaide High School	State Government Entity Education Institution	Community Futsal Court Resurface	\$150,000	\$100,000	<p>The project is to support the resurface of the existing Futsal court at Adelaide High School in Ellis Park/Tampawardli (Park 24).</p> <p>Due to its open and accessible nature, the existing court is heavily used outside of school hours, including by One Culture Football, local soccer clubs, disability sports groups and the general community. The manufacturer and supplier have stated that the surface has reached its 'end of use' due to the frequency of use. The current court condition presents a safety risk. The new surface will be assessed for durability for ongoing community access.</p> <p>The project will achieve several outcomes in relation to quality infrastructure:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increase community access • Increase the facilities carrying capacity and therefore participation • Provide a fit for purpose facility • Address a safety issue • Improve aesthetic of the facility 	<p>Beneficiaries:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Culturally and linguistically diverse people • At risk youth • People with disabilities • School community • Community sports clubs <p>The panel felt that this project offered greater community access than the other projects in this round, as the futsal court is accessible to the broader community outside of school hours. The panel did not support full funding for this project as they felt funds were better spread across several projects to ensure greater community impact. The panel also recognised that although the facility is open to the community outside of school hours, it is heavily utilised by the school and therefore felt the school should be make a greater financial contribution.</p> <p>Funding is subject to obtaining the landlord approval required to proceed and is based on a similar surface quoted in the application still being used - not a cheaper version, due to less funds being offered.</p>	\$50,000
Christian Brothers College	Other Unincorporated Entity Education Institution	Installation of Lights Park 15 (Upper Oval)	\$137,000	\$100,000	<p>The project is to support the installation of new sports lighting (towers and luminaries) on the upper oval of King Rodney/Itayami-itpina (Park 15), allowing more community groups (including girls football) to access the park more safely and spread the wear load more evenly across the two ovals licenced by Christian Brothers College. The project also incorporates an upgrade to the existing lighting of the bottom oval.</p> <p>The oval will continue to be used by CBC and its Old Scholars, but the lighting will allow additional carrying capacity in the evening, creating opportunities for St Aloysius College and the SANFL Umpires Association who have requested use as well as other community groups to hire the oval.</p> <p>The project will meet several outcomes in relation to quality infrastructure:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increase community access 	<p>Beneficiaries:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - School community - Community sports clubs <p>The panel were supportive of this project but only the installation of the new lights on the upper oval. They felt that the application was well written but that more community impact would occur with new lighting rather than upgrading existing lighting. The panel agreed that they did not feel there was as much community benefit as the Adelaide High project because the general community use would not increase, as you would only be able to access the oval (and its new lights) if you were hiring it or would need the school to switch on the lights. They did agree that the project would enable an increased use for the existing groups and the introduction of some new formal user groups.
