Summary of the Draft Park Lands Community Buildings (Sport and Recreation) Policy

## Background

- Workshops with Council Members on 15 August 2023 and Kadaltilla Board Members on 24 August 2023 informed the development of a first Draft Policy to guide investment in the upgrade and redevelopment of Community Buildings.
- Public consultation on that Draft Policy took place between 20 October and 27 November 2023.
- Key consultation themes strong support for:
  - Buildings relevant to facilities and users
  - Quality design
  - Shared facilities
  - Co-funding



## Background

- Concerns raised about car parking, trees and the practicality of achieving no net loss of Park Lands with low scale, shared fit for purpose facilities.
- These strategic tensions were workshopped with Kadaltilla Board Members on 28 March 2024. Kadaltilla's advice was:
  - Include a design review process consistent with ODASA, including a visual impact assessment
  - Incorporate high level principles that set the standard
  - Review each building design on a case by case basis



- This revised Draft Policy is substantially different to the version consulted on in 2023
- Public consultation on the Draft Policy opened on 16
  September and will run to 14 October 2024
- The Draft Policy is consistent with current and draft Adelaide Park Lands Management Strategy
- Leasing eligibility and use of Community Buildings is informed by Park Lands Lease and Licence Policy and does not form part of this Draft Policy



- Objective 1 Maximise investment and community benefits
  - Consolidate buildings to ensure shared resources, multiple users
  - Broad utilisation throughout the day and evening
- Objective 2 Fulfil the intended purpose with minimal impact
  - Fulfil intended purpose with infrastructure aligned to the outdoor areas being serviced
  - Design to reflect ODASA principles prioritising:
    - compact layouts
    - multi-functional spaces
    - efficient circulation
    - shared use

- Objective 3 Quality, welcoming and inclusive
  - All Community Buildings have core elements that are publically accessible, eg public toilets, seating
  - Most Community Buildings have essential elements, eg changerooms, amenities
  - Some Community Buildings have optional elements, eg common room, kitchen
- Objective 4 Invest in facilities that meet the needs of users and the public
  - Council investment focused on:
    - Facilities not exceeding the minimum standards
    - Accessible core elements
    - Landscaping
    - Compliance
    - Sustainability

- Objective 5 Sustainable development
  - Achieve 5-star Green Star or equivalent
  - Encourage sustainable transport options
- Objective 6 Consistent approach to design
  - CoA lead the design process
  - Design review utilising skills and knowledge of Kadaltilla
  - Visual impact assessment required

- Implementation Prioritise Community Building projects by assessing:
  - Asset condition, eg age and structural condition
  - Functionality, eg level of compliance
  - Community benefit, eg who is it serving and who could it serve
  - Capacity to partner, eg ability of eligible organisations to contribute to the upgrade/redevelopment

## **Next Steps**

- Collate feedback submissions from Kadaltilla, other stakeholders and the community.
- Present consultation findings to Council on 5 November 2024 and seek adoption of the Policy.
- Implement Policy through projects prioritised by Council and formalised through its Investment Plan that will be assessed annually through Council's Annual Business Plan and Budget Process, noting Golden Wattle Park / Mirnu Wirra (Park 21W) and Mary Lee Park (Park 27B) are currently progressing through detailed design.
